(1) On January 18, 2021, Fremont College signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used the applicable amount of funds designated under the CRRSAA (a)(4) programs to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

(2) The total amount of funds that Fremont College will receive or has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs is \$142,271.

(3) As of **March 30, 2021**, the total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under the CRRSAA (a)(4) programs is <u>\$34,040</u>.

(4) As of **March 30, 2021**, <u>92 students</u> at the institution are eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA (a)(4) programs.

(5) <u>92 students</u> received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under the CRRSAA (a)(4) programs as of March 30, 2021.

(6) The method(s) used by the institution to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs.

Fremont College will award and distribute the HEERF II grant funds as follows:

- Must be an active, undergraduate student
- Completion of a valid 2020-21 FAFSA
- Pell-eligible student with exceptional need
- Not be a Gift of Knowledge Scholarship recipient
- Amount of award is based on the number of eligible applicants and available funding
- Round 1 (January-March 30, 2021 Quarter): Each eligible student will receive \$370.00

(7) Any instructions, directions, or guidance provided by the institution to students concerning the Emergency Financial Aid Grants.

Grants have been awarded to Pell-eligible students based on their Expected Family Contribution (EFC) on the 2020-2021 FAFSA. Students were instructed that these grant funds are for use by the student for any component of student's cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care) or child care.
